ABOUT SHAMWARI GAME RESERVE

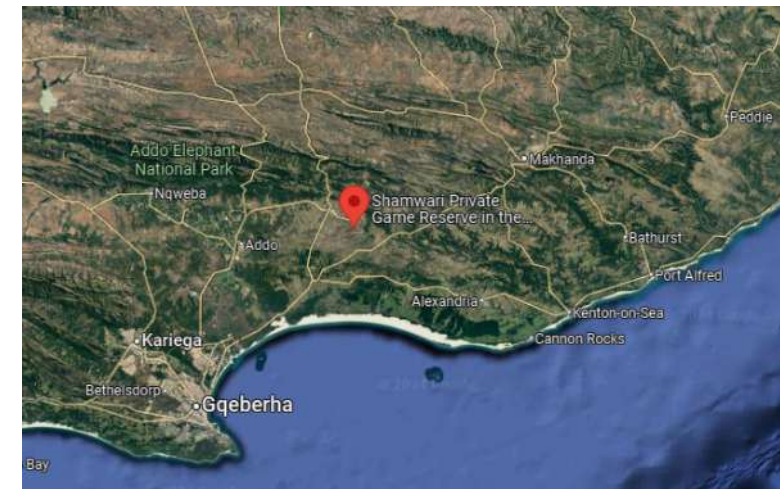
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Shamwari Game Reserve

Shamwari, meaning 'my friend' in Shona, is the pinnacle of game reserves stretching 25,000 hectares over a malaria free landscape, it offers an award-winning nature experience and is one of the largest private conservation initiatives in Southern Africa.

Located in the Eastern Cape Province of South Africa, Shamwari occupies a unique ecological transition zone where multiple biomes converge. The reserve encompasses diverse habitats ranging from semi-arid Karoo vegetation to subtropical thicket and indigenous forest, creating exceptional biodiversity within a relatively compact area.

Shamwari has a dedicated wildlife and conservation department with a wildlife veterinarian and ecologists who run the wildlife breeding, animal rehabilitation, Vulpro and rhino awareness centre, they also operate an anti-poaching unit and animal hospital. Offering the 'Big 5' it also hosts the Born Free Foundation Big Cat Sanctuary for rescued lions and leopards.



Project Overview

The Shamwari Group Conservation Experience is a once in a lifetime chance to get behind the scenes and involved with the conservation efforts of the world renowned Shamwari Game Reserve. The programme is a tailor-made experience operating over a two-week period, we work with you to put together the best possible programme. This is a working field trip, and you will be taking part in hands-on activities based on the requirements of the reserve.

Shamwari boasts a multi-purpose centre geared to get participants involved in various components of conservation. The experience is a true reflection of the day-to-day operational requirements needed to manage the game reserve.

The project specialises in conservation, with a focus on ecology, wildlife, and environmental education with local community and sporting interactions as part of our social responsibility drive. Shamwari is situated in a malaria free zone and is one hour away from the closest major airport, medical facilities and other amenities in Port Elizabeth.



Conservation Management

Whilst on your placement you will become members of the conservation department and will therefore work with the wildlife's best interests in mind at all times. Details of possible conservation, research and veterinary-based activities are detailed below, we will use these to build your tailor-made experience and ensure that all activities chosen by your group will be covered over the two week period.

- Game monitoring: Rhino, Elephant and Predators
- Camera trapping
- Anti-Poaching Unit (APU) engagement
- Use of telemetry tracking
- Research projects
- Game sex and ratio recordings
- Tracks, signs and spoor
- Field skills
- Insect, rodent and bird surveys
- Nocturnal animal monitoring (night-drive)
- Rifle handling and shooting (additional cost on weekend)



YOUR PROJECT

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Reserve Maintenance

Several activities include hands-on work in the field, which is vital to the conservation work at Shamwari.

- Restoring degraded thickets and landscapes
- Erosion Control
- Fence inspections
- Alien vegetation control
- Reserve clean-ups
- Road Maintenance
- Assist with cleaning and maintenance of bomas and water troughs



YOUR PROJECT

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Community Project

Conservation does not stop at conserving nature alone but includes a responsibility to uplift local communities. Weekly trips are made into the local community to assist in various projects.

- Age in Action (elderly day centre)
- Painting Classrooms
- Recycling Projects
- Building Jungle Gyms
- Creating and Maintaining Vegetable Gardens
- Sports Activities
- Brain training and other educational activities with local children



Possible Rehabilitation Centre Visits

Born Free Sanctuary

- A UK-based charity that rescues animals from captivity
- Born Free at Shamwari acts as a sanctuary for a number of big cats rescued from poor conditions across Europe who are unable to be reintroduced into the wild
- Possible activities include
 - Presentation on the work of the sanctuary
 - Guided tour of the sanctuary by one of the keepers.
 - Visit to the gift shop



Hands-on at Vulpro

- VulPro (Vulture Rehabilitation & Breeding Centre) is a leader in Vulture conservation in Africa, dedicated to reversing the decline in vulture populations
- VulPro at Shamwari is a dedicated centre for managing and supporting populations of vultures in the area
- Possible activities include
 - Maintaining Waterholes and Enclosures
 - Collecting Nesting Material
 - Upgrading Perches
 - Feeding Vultures
 - Photographing Birds

Sample Itinerary

- Introduction presentation and drive through the reserve followed by manual work, making pine poles
- Group 1: APU talk and snare finding activity; Group 2 : Rhino monitoring. Groups swap for the afternoon
- Group 1: Manual work, road maintenance; Group 2 : Visit the Born Free Foundation. Groups swap for the afternoon. After dinner, its Film Night
- All: Community day, the group will be assigned a specific project to undertake
- Weekend at leisure. Additional activities can be arranged away from the reserve, or you can relax at the reserve enjoying the sights and sounds of Africa making the most of the swimming pool and garden
- Presentation on tracking and the use of telemetry equipment followed by predator monitoring. In the afternoon learn to make beads
- Group 1 : Elephant debate and information prep; Group 2 : Elephant monitoring. Groups swap for the afternoon
- All: Manual work and predator tracking in the afternoon. After dinner night drive patrol
- Game capture talk, view the bomas and capture system and then cleaning of water holes
- All: Community day, the group will be assigned a specific project. Braai (BBQ) night
- Weekend at leisure

It's important to remember that wildlife does not work to an agenda, therefore activities may change at short notice!

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Shamwari

You will be accommodated in a purpose-built lodge located on the reserve. Rooms are shared with ensuite bathrooms.

There is a communal area with lounge, bar and dining area as well as a small lecture room. There is a laundry service once a week.

The lodge grounds offer a swimming pool, large garden area and boma; enjoy sitting around the fire in the evening.

Internet access is available although speeds are not as good as in the UK.



Food at the Project

Three meals are provided daily. Meals will either be taken at the accommodation or as a pre-packed serving, depending on planned or unscheduled activities.

Dietary Requirements

Provision can be made for Vegetarian & Vegan diets and for those who have a medical condition such as Coeliac disease that requires a Gluten Free Diet and for those with severe allergies to dairy, eggs or nuts.

Suggested kit list

To allow for ease of transfer to the project a soft holdall/soft suitcase is preferred.

- Sweatshirt/Fleece (Winter months pack plenty)
- Padded jacket/windbreaker (Winter months) although it can get very cold on an open vehicle even in summer

- Warm hat (Winter only) / Hat for sun protection (all year)
